Introduction

IP Australia

IP Australia is the Australian Government agency that administers intellectual property (IP) legislation relating to patents, trade marks, designs and plant breeder's rights. IP Australia does not have responsibility for copyright policy, which is administered by the Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Communications.

Objectives

IP Australia is looking at how Australia's IP system can help support the cultural integrity and economic potential of Indigenous Knowledge held by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, which includes:

- Traditional Knowledge (TK) know-how, practices, techniques and skills; and
- Traditional Cultural Expressions (TCEs) visual imagery, performance, design, words and names.

Purpose of this document

This document sets out our intended work for calendar years 2020 and 2021. It includes information about how we intend to progress with further analysis, consultation and implementation of the proposals which received support during our consultation on Indigenous Knowledge issues. The work plan has been designed to reflect findings from our consultations with Indigenous and non-Indigenous people.

This work plan was first released in December 2019 but amendments have been made in response to COVID-19 as well as to include work we will undertake relating to the government response to the House of Representatives Standing Committee on Indigenous Affairs' *Report on the impact of inauthentic art and craft in the style of First Nations peoples*. This work plan will benefit from consultations with the arts industry and development of an *Indigenous Visual Art Action Plan* announced in September 2020 following the release of the government response.

Background

In August 2019, we published a consultation report providing a summary record of the feedback we received. Four themes emerged from the consultations, and we are mindful of the need to conduct work on IK in a manner that reflects these four themes:



Control

Indigenous people want to be able to control who uses Indigenous Knowledge and how it is used.



Protection

Indigenous people are seeking measures that can be used to stop unauthorised use of Indigenous Knowledge and impose sanctions against misappropriation.

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Recognition

Indigenous people want to be recognised as the owners of their Indigenous Knowledge.



Respect

Indigenous people want their ownership of Indigenous Knowledge and the cultural protocols associated with it to be respected.

IP Australia previously published a consultation paper in September 2018, further exploring the issues raised in a 2017 discussion paper. Part A of our consultation paper provided an overview of those issues and asked stakeholders if there were additional issues that we should consider. Part B of the consultation paper focussed on issues that relate particularly to the responsibilities of IP Australia.

In 2017, IP Australia and the Department of Industry, Innovation and Science commissioned a discussion paper, Indigenous Knowledge: Issues for protection and management, from Terri Janke and Company. This discussion paper provided a comprehensive examination of the issues affecting protection and management of Indigenous Knowledge and identified six key issues.
