INTRODUCTION

IP Australia is looking at how Australia's intellectual property (IP) system can help support the cultural integrity and economic potential of Indigenous Knowledge (IK) held by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. When we talk about IK, we are referring to:

- Traditional Knowledge (TK) know how, practices, techniques and skills; and
- Traditional Cultural Expressions (TCEs) visual imagery, performance, design, words and names.

This work plan follows on from our 2020-21 IK Work Plan and sets out key next steps for IP Australia's work on IK. The initiatives are based on feedback we heard in our 2021 Indigenous Knowledge consultations.

IP Australia's Approach to Indigenous Knowledge

IP Australia is committed to better engagement with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. To put this into action we are:

- Looking at how we approach Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander engagement and taking steps to ensure Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander perspectives remain central to the activities in this work plan.
- Progressing IK policy changes in a way that is led by our engagement with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. Proposed changes will be adapted to reflect what Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people tell us.

Part of our on-going approach includes elements of our previous IK work plan which are now reflected in IP Australia's Reconciliation Action Plan, such as:

- Increasing Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples' engagement on issues at the World Intellectual Property Organization (WIPO).
- Making sure IP Australia staff have training and resources to consider IK in appropriate and culturally respectful ways.
- Providing information about IP and IK issues to build awareness, such as at events held by IP Australia or other organisations.
- Considering how we can support people who are interested in using IP protections for IK, including labelling for authentic goods.

Who is IP Australia?

IP Australia is the Australian Government agency that administers IP rights and legislation relating to patents, trade marks, designs and plant breeder's rights. IP Australia does not have responsibility for copyright policy, which is administered by the Attorney General's Department.
